

## **Coexisting with Coyotes**

Coyotes are common in our area. With a few simple actions, you can help reduce conflicts with people and pets.

## To avoid conflicts with coyotes:

Stay on authorized trails.

Coyotes use other natural paths to avoid us.

Keep your dog on a leash.

Coyotes view unrestrained dogs as threats.

Do not feed coyotes.

Feeding makes coyotes lose fear of people.



Healthy coyotes are wary of people and normally try to avoid us. During certain times of year, instead of running away, coyotes may stand their ground and act defensively because a pregnant mate or pups are nearby. They may bark or "escort" people and dogs out of their territories by following them until they leave.

If you encounter a coyote that seems to be defending an area, consider there may be pups nearby, and alter your route. If a coyote follows you or barks at you, stay calm, control your pet, and keep it close; slowly leave the area the way you came. Do not turn your back, and do not run. These actions may invite the coyote to chase you. If it continues to approach, try to scare it away by yelling, waving your arms, and/or throwing something at it.

Enjoy watching coyotes from a distance. Respect their spaces, and make them respect yours.
